Dear Uncle & Aunt!

First hearty greetings to you all.

Share with you, the fact that we are still healthy and lively and hope the same also from you. Your letter we received, and having written to us, we ought personally our request write. At present we have decided also to America move. If you see it for good that would finalize that we would come, then you need not write again to separate us but send as soon as possible the ticket fare, thus we would get the papers in order here, because the ships are already occupied until the month of January. However completely gladly will we repay you afterwards for the journey and expenses. Here we have also no more pleasure, where we work only for daily bread, and never come on a green branch. Sister Sophie is pleased already much to the journey to America. She will also probably tell you, where and how we came to the decision. Perhaps you can also still remember as you were here in attendance, and I told you my request. A joyful reply look forward to conclude!
